Why do Background Research?


Background research provides general information to better understand a subject and provides useful keywords to help you build a search. Dictionaries and encyclopedias are credible resources for background research.

Where to Locate these Resources

An easy way to locate background research is in the library's encyclopedias and dictionaries databases. Additional resources can be found on the web through a Google search or using a resource such as Wikipedia.


How to Search for Encyclopedias and Dictionaries in the Library

1. Click on the Encyclopedias & Dictionaries button on the library's homepage.



2. Read the description of each database to determine if it will contain the type of information you

need.
